Tim and Tina Louderback and Sean and Shelley Blacksten are missionaries who live in the country of Panama. They want churches in the U.S. to come help them in their work to tell people about Jesus.

"Americas Connect" is a program they started to help churches know how to be a part of their work. Panama was the first country for Americas Connect and then churches also traveled to Guatemala, Costa Rica and Brazil. Sometimes one church sends helpers to many different countries and sometimes they choose to stick with just one country.

Sean said the teams from the U.S. really encourage them in their work, especially people who are taking their first international trip.

"Our prayer is that [churches] will be the first among many who come to work alongside us and that some would choose to build on their experience in Central America," Sean says.

Missions doesn't end when the Americas Connect trip ends, the Louderbacks say. They encourage churches to put what they learn on the mission field into practice when they return to the U.S.

Skip and Kim both grew up speaking Spanish. Today God is using their Spanish skills and understanding of Latino culture to train Hispanics and Latinos to serve in South Asia. That means Christians from Hispanic countries are moving to South Asia to share the gospel.

Skip says he is glad to help others be faithful and effective long-term missionaries.

WEST AFRICANS TAKE LEAD IN SHARING BIBLE STORIES

Togo is a country in West Africa. Missionary Katee Sheppard works in Togo and in other countries in West Africa.

For years, IMB missionaries and national partners in West Africa have been sharing the good news of Jesus by telling Bible stories out loud. Some cultures don't read and write; they prefer to learn Bible stories by hearing them spoken.

Katee Sheppard* has seen firsthand the impact that Bible stories in Africans' heart languages can have.

"They ask questions and God opens doors that lead many to Christ," Katee says.

Now African Christians are leading workshops in how to tell the stories for thousands of believers representing dozens of languages. In Togo, there is a school called the Baptist Bible Institute of Togo that teaches this important ministry so that many, many more people can hear the good news of Jesus.

TURKMEN SEARCH FOR HOPE

Have you heard of the country of Turkmenistan? Many people haven't! It's a small country in Central Asia and the people who live there are called Turkmen.

Life in Turkmenistan is very hard and many people have to travel to other countries to find work. They are desperate to take care of their families. Missionaries help them find jobs and food, but the most important thing they do is tell them about Jesus. Some Turkmen who move to other countries hear about Jesus for the first time.

When a Turkmen becomes a Christian, though, life can become even more difficult, because people are not free to follow Jesus in their country. When people tell others that they believe in Jesus, they risk losing jobs, being rejected by family, and being mistreated.

"People are coming to faith," says Anthony Bingham*, an IMB worker in Central Asia. "But coming to faith means you are signing up for a rougher life."

When a woman called "Momma" first heard Bible stories, she wasn't sure if she believed them.

One day Momma's daughter came with the terrible news that the family pig had died. In this area, a pig is worth a lot of money and they could not afford to lose it.

"Momma marched down to the pigpen where this crowd had gathered from the village," Stephen explains. "She just crawled into the pigpen and got down on her knees and said, 'God, if You're real, then show these people that You're real.' And while she was praying, the dead pig stood up." God raised the pig to life!

Momma believed and was baptized the next day. Many others have also accepted Jesus.

CHRISTIANS SEND MORE MISSIONARIES

When IMB missionary Jeremiah Farmer moved to Taiwan, he saw a need in the churches – no one was being sent out as missionaries. Jeremiah and other IMB missionaries focused on training Christians in Taiwan to send out people to be missionaries to other countries.

In 2020, Baptists in Taiwan sent out 5 missionaries. This year, nine more missionaries are being sent. Those being sent are young and old, married and single, male and female. One woman sent in 2019 moved to the Northern Africa and Middle Eastern region. Luna, a single woman, is learning the Arabic language and has already been building relationships with those she meets in the city and markets.

Jeremiah is glad to see his Taiwanese friends become missionaries.

"The IMB sent our earliest missionaries to East Asia, a mission field, and now, 175 years later, they are beginning to be 'sent' along with us to other mission fields." Day 7
